

The Kingston House elections in September 1964 were undoubtedly the most spectacular in this house plan's short history. The race for every office was carefully fought and well planned.

The presidential candidates were Steve Weiser and Eddie Brown. Eddie began campaigning early by taking advantage of the house cleaning and was very successful in drumming up support for himself and his running mate, Richard Defiore. The CHP race between Al Ganzer and Ken Burling saw Ken's knowledge of political matters while Al

KINGSTON WORKS FOR FREE TUITION-Eddig Brown

Las: October the student body of Queens Wollege was ar by the fear that tuition would soon be imposed at all colleges of the city univercity; everyone agreed this had to be stopped. Kingston House realized that this called for more then words, and we stepped foward to assist in this "struggle".

We began by inviting State Assemblyman Anthony P. Savarese, a Republican from Queens, to clarify his stand on the question of the free fuition in high to. Uns tisfied we decided ---- in twe would suggest the Student Association's "invasion" of Mr. Savarese's district.

On Saturday, October 31, we joined our fellow students in conversing the Assemblyman's district, to make his constituents aware of the importance of this issue. Despite the resistance and lack of interest displayed by many of the people we came in contact with, it was avery wewardin experience. Our action was, at least, partially responsible for Mr. Savarese's defeat by a total of more than 6,000 votes in adistrict that went a most completely republican.

SENATE ELECTIONS by Jeff Richman

In December, 1964, five members of Kingston House decided to run for Senate. They were Steve Fuller, Richie Meissel, Dave Mintzes, Harry Nass, and Jeff Richman. All five ran on a platform which stood for better representation of C.H.P. in the Student Association. Of the five, only Richie Meissel and Dave Mintzes received support from C.H.P., but due to Harry Nass' tremendous effort in campaigning among the houseplans, this obstacle was overcome. Harry Nass was elected senator and Richie Meissel, Dave Mintzes, and Jeff Richman were elected alternate senators who have a voice in Senate but a vote only when a regular senator is absent. Steve Fuller missed election by a very small margin.

At present, Harry Nass, as a member of the Club Activities Committee, has proposed legislation which would allow religious and political organizations on campus to be exclusive in their acceptance of members. Jeff Richman, as a member of the Academic Affairs Committe, is co-ordinator of the Faculty-Student softball game, the proceeds of which will be donated to the Appalachian Summer Project. Richie Meissel, as a member of the Foreign Student Committee, has been instrumental in coordinating Foreign Student Teas and International Night.

SENATE COMMITTEES by Al Ganzer Having developed into a power in CHP, the men of Kingston House have decided that they would like to enter into school politics. To further this objective, five freshmen, (Harry Nass, Jeff Richman, Dave Mintzes, Richie Meissel and Steve Fuller) ran for Senate seats last semester. Unfortunately, only one, Harry Nass was elected senator while Richman, Mintzes and Meissel became alternates.

Realizing that experience could be valuable, many members of Kingston joined Senate Committees. Al Ganzer, Jeff Richman, and Eddie Brown are on Academic Affairs, Richie Branciforte, Stan Marcus, Don Tobias and Steve Shaw are on NSA, Harry Nass represents the Gods on Club Activities, and Richie Meissel and Dave Mintzes are on Foreign Students.

Morrison, Assisstant Executive Director of the Liberal Party of New York State, spoke to about 50 members of the House and the Political Science Club on the "Role of the Third Party in the American Two Party System." After his brief talk, he answered many questions on the aims and purposes of the Liberal Party. The standing ovation after his address expressed the attitude of those attending his talk.

On Wednesday, March 24th, John F. English, the dynamic Democratic leader of Nassau County, appeared at the College. Even though he arrived about 20 minutes late, the room was filled to near capacity. Three nembers of the faculty of the Political Science Department attended. Mr. English spoke on a "Reform Program for Campaign Contributions and Expenditures." The importance of his talk brought the local newspapers to the campus, and on the following day, the Long Island Press devoted three columns and a picture to the speech. We hope that Mr. English will appear again next term.

For a normal houseplan, this roster of speakers would be satisfactory. But not for Kingston House!! On April 28th, Mr. I. D. Kingston House, best Male House Plan 1963-64, in leading with its pllicy of helping newly formed and Freshman House Plans is setting up the framework for freshman house plan council. The puppose of this council would be to aid new house plans in forming and in Starting constructive programs. This would be the function of an advisory board established by the council. PLEASE, NO FIRE NEXT TIME - Eddie Brown


